



The Ultimate Filter

The item illustrated below was designed by Jay Hennigan, WB6RDV, and was made public in the Santa Barbara Key Klix monthly newsletter, via the Indiana ARC and Kilo Watt Harmonics. He discusses this filter as follows:

The device in the diagram serves many useful purposes:

- Convince that unwanted interfering station to install it on his transmitter and make appropriate connections. His signal will magically disappear from your receiver. Although not recommended, the unit may be connected to your receiver.
- Use it as an inexpensive burglar alarm for your antenna system. Anyone attempting to steal antennas protected by this device will be quite alarmed.

- 3. Use it as a TVI eliminator.

 Momentarily connect it to the TV to
 permanently cure all forms of TVI.

 Stubborn cases may require treatment
 of the TV viewer as well.
- 4. Use a CB dummy load. Tell a CB dummy to tune his transmitter into this!

I am sure you will come up with many more innovatative uses for this unit, and trust it will become a welcome addition to your hamshack.



Arkansas Highway Laws

There are more tourists coming to Arkansas each year. For their information and safety, we list here a few traffic laws that are unique to this area.

1. All Arkansas drivers are very courteous. As they pass another car, they almost always hold up one finger which means, "You are number one with us." This is also used as a greeting when meeting a police car.

 A stop sign means you should stop only when there is another car in the intersection. In that case when you have to stop, you should blow you

horn.

- Posted speed limits refer to suggested minimum speeds only. One should always try to drive faster than this to avoid being run over by native drivers.
- Most mountain roads have double yellow lines down the middle.
 In Arkansas this is used as a passing lane.
- One should never follow another car too closely in the mountains. At least 20 inches is required for safety.
- 6. Turn signals should never be used BEFORE making a turn unless you reserve the right to change the intended direction of the turn. Then, use the other direction signal to keep your options open in the other lane.

7. Turn signals MAY be used DURING and AFTER particularly difficult turns to celebrate success in

the accomplishment.

8. In an effort to promote local businesses, drive with one foot on the brake and one foot on the accelerator. By alternately pressing one, then the other, at random intervals, you help promote local wreckers, body shops, brake shops, AND your local law enforcement agencies and hospitals.

Best Fruit Cake Ever

Not only for Christmas, but all year long!

1 Cup butter

1 tsp. baking powder

1 Cup brown sugar

1 Cup sugar

1 tsp. baking soda

Nuts

4 large eggs

1 tsp. salt

1 or 2 Quarts Whiskey

1 Cup dried fruit Lemon juice



From the English G3 came nary a sound. He continued his vigil and on through the night,


But so far as DX, he got ne'er a bite.

Our members have been very busy with chasing DX, antenna projects and DXpeditions. Because of this, membership and interest in DXing have grown in Oklahoma. There are many Technician class hams who have discovered the fun of Dxing by listening to DXers talk about their latest accomplishments. They are studying code, buying transceivers and listening to DX. Try to encourage these new hams as these are the Dxers of tomorrow. Their skills and ability depend on training, and the only source of that training is by the experienced DXer. Have you invited a new ham into your shack to listen to DX...in the past month? How about in the past year? We all know that DX is contagious...Do your part to spread this part of our hobby.

UPCOMING DXPEDITIONS

AD1S and AH9B will travel to
Kwajalein Atoll in the Republic of the
Marshall Islands for the Japanese DX Lowband CW test and will spend post-contest
time on WARC, RTTY and CW modes.
Craig and George will depart OKC on
January 8th, 1993, and will be on the atoll
for about 7 days. Listen for V73B and
V73S. QSL to OKDXA, of course.

The Palau DX pedition by NJIV and WV5S has been postponed until early 1993. Watch this column for more information as the exact dates, etc. become known.

The BIG news for early 1993 is the Dxpedition to KINGMAN REEF, KH5K and PALMYRA ISLAND, KH5 by a team of 10-12 operators which will include OKDXA member AH9B. (Craig will be a busy guy in the first quarter of 1993.) The operators will depart Honolulu February 20-21, 1993, on the Motor sailer "Machias". (This is the same vessel that is being used by the BakerHowland Dxpedition in January 1993.) They expect a five day sail to Kingman where some of the operators will activate KH5K while the vessel transports the rest of the team to Palmyra. The vessel will then return to Kingman Reef to support the ops. on the world's smallest DX country (10 feet by 50 feet at high tide). About halfway into the effort, there will be an exchange of operators so all will have the "opportunity" to operate from KH5K. One operator will be dedicated to RTTY and another to six meters, satellite, etc. The Dxpedition planner is NOAFW of Clipperton Island fame, and operators signed up to date include AH9B, V73CT/ AH9C, WORLX, GOLMX, W7KNT and at least one other European operator. There is

room for a few more operators, but time is growing short. Contact NOAFW at his callbook address right away if you are interested and available. Heavy DX and/or contest experience in all modes is preferred and the upfront cost is expected to be between \$2500 and \$3500 plus air transportation to Honolulu. ICOM America and Oklahoma Comm Center are significant contributors to this effort, and the QSL route is VIA OKDXA!

OKDXA NET THRIVES

The OKDXA weekend net has been graced by numerous checkins during the past few weeks. You are invited to check in even if you don't happen to be an OKDXA member (yet). The net meets every Saturday morning at 11:00 a.m LOCAL TIME on or about 7.235 Mhz. We usually have twelve to fifteen check-ins and exchange a lot of DX and QSL information in the net. If you are a new DXer, this is an ideal time to rub elbows with Oklahoma DXers who have worked and confirmed between 300 and 350 countries! See you on the net every weekend except when there is a large hamfest or major DX contest scheduled.

IRC's - WHAT'S THAT?

After the DXer makes the contact, the hard part begins. If the DX station has a QSL manager, you will have to send your contacts in an hour! Experience shows that about half of these stations will request a QSL. That means 100 incoming cards for every hour of operation! Your postcard and a nineteen cent stamp will NOT get a reply. You can send QSLs through the ARRL. bureau, but this is a slow process and frankly, bureau cards get the lowest level of priority with QSL managers and DX (slightly above the 19 cent postcard, but not much...).

If you want a fast reply, use the SASE/ SAE method followed by DXers all over the world. Follow these steps:

1. Carefully complete your QSL making doubly sure that all dates and times are correct. Use UTC time only. Never use CST, CDST, etc., as your date and time may never match up with the DX log.

Make sure that your callsign is written on BOTH SIDES of your QSL. (Saves flipflopping the card.)

Write your name and address in block letters on the outside of a small envelope that will fit inside your mailing envelope, preferably without folding. If the DX uses a stateside manager, place a 29 cent stamp on this envelope. If you are sending your card anywhere else in the world, it is mandatory for you to enclose funds or IRC's sufficient for the DX or manager to buy postage to mail your card to you. DO NOT expect the DX or manager to pay this cost. If you don't send postage; your card will wind up with the bureau cards or that 19 cent special. Maybe someday you'll get your card; then again, maybe you won't.


 Place your card and the return envelope inside a slightly larger envelope for mailing to the DX or manager. Almost

card to the manager and wait for you card to be answered by the volunteers who perform this thankless task. If you send a QSL request to a DX station or a manager, DO NOT send a "postcard" and expect an answer. Remember, the DX does not need your card; YOU need his. If you listen to DX pileups, you will quickly realize that a skilled DX station can make over 200 all cards, envelopes and contributions will add up to less than one-half ounce, thus requiring 50 cents airmail postage to anywhere in the world.


Reply Coupon. They can be bought at your local post office for about a dollar, or you can get them from various local sources for half that amount. (Current sources for IRC's @ 50 cents each: WV5S, AH9B, AD1S.) IRC's circulate all over as "legal tender" by DXers and seldom are ever really cashed in for postage. They are just sold again and again. As long as only one side of the IRC is canceled, it is a negotiable instrument.

But what about the "Green Stamp"?
Many DXers and DX chasers prefer to slip
one or two dollars into the envelope in lieu
of several IRC's. This is perfectly
acceptable in most countries except for
India, Pakistan and a few other closed
societies where possession of a foreign
currency is punishable by death! Exercise
caution if you are not sure. By the way,
green stamps are VERY welcome in the old
Soviet Republics.

And what about extra contributions? What do I "owe" the DXer? That question varies as much as the tip some folks leave at a nice restaurant. Some folks get great service, eat a \$40 meal and leave a buck for the server. Others in the same circumstance might leave a \$20 bill. It is an individual decision and so is a contribution for an expensive, wellrun DX operation. And yes, DXer's who live in a "rare" country also have extraordinary expenses and should be considered for a contribution. It is a major sacrifice for hams in many nations to buy the gasoline to run the generators that provide their AC power. They sacrifice their time to make their country available for DXers and the cost of a single QSL is usually between 5 and 10 cents. That doesn't sound like much unless you monthly income is only \$30! No, I am not suggesting "professional" radio operators for DX purposes; I am talking about common sense and common courtesy for some very uncommon people. Just think what DX would be like if VR6TC couldn't keep oil in the lamps on Pitcairn; or if 9NIMM had never taken a radio to Nepal, because it "was too much trouble..."

If you have a difficult time perceiving the plight of the QSL manager, I would invite you to visit my shack someday and try to find a place to sit that doesn't have a stack of cards waiting to be sent to some deserving DXer. OKDXA services about a dozen current and an equal number of inactive DX stations. The volume of cards in and out of Box 88, Wellston, OK, every week is staggering, and we are a relatively small QSL route. Do your part to make the DXers life easier...until next month, GOOD DX!

Western, on the first Tuesday of every month.

I think that many were entertained at the meeting by our guest speaker Glenn Turner, NF7T, who explained that MORI will be happier with the 146.925 coordination because of greater coverage allowed by being the only repeater in the state on that

frequency. Thank you Glenn for all of your hard work in frequency coordination. It is greatly appreciated as well as was your appearance at the November meeting.

I believe another big plus for the last meeting was the question and answer session that took place. Not only was thing informative for the members of MORI but it was informative for the officers as well. I know that it helped me understand what topics the members cared about the most, and why they were members of MORI. First of all is a sense of belonging to a family. They were a part of MORI because they like the idea of being recognized whenever they give their callgign on frequency. The members were also interested in the autopatch and it's availability in case of an emergency. Next, I believe the members were interested in the expansion of MORI with greater coverage, access, and reliability, all of which are on the way.

GREATER COVERAGE, ACCESS, AND RELIABILITY

Our Technical director has informed me that all of changes are about to take place. As of this writing the finishing touches are being put on the 146.07/67 machine for the grand move and final resting place of the brand new solid state repeater out at Channel 4's tower. Hopefully, weather will be on our side and will allow the change to take place in the first week of December. What a Christmas present!

WHAT ABOUT THE ACC CONTROLERS?

The RC-85 controller was sent back to ACC. The tape on the EEPROM had been taken off and many damages done away before we even took office. Needless to say it was useless and it was deemed necessary by the executive committee to send the 85 back to ACC for repair so that .925 can go on the air. Also, an ACC autopatch board was ordered for the RC-850 controller to get rid of the annoying line noise and distortion on the .67 autopatch. (It was getting so bad, the person the telephone could not even understand who it was that was calling.) This was also an effort to curtail any downtime with the autopatch. The present autopatch was a RAP-200 that was 25 years old (and close to the grave.)

146.925 TO AIR SOON!

All of the pieces are together and working, the crystals have been ordered and the case is being finished to put the .925 machine on the air for the very first time. You can look for this addition to MORI in the first week in January. (Weather cooperating.) This repeater will also have autopatch capability with a phone line that is shared with the .67 machine. Two people cannot make an autopatch at the same time,

but you should always be able to make an autopatch on one machine or the other. Look for this machine in January!

444.1 - A MORI MACHINE

It was verified at the meeting by NF7T that the 444.1 frequency coordination is still property of MORI and will be on the air before February. When the repeater does come back on the air, I encourage all to use it as much as possible. Populate the frequency with activity and let people know that we do plan to use the frequency. Even if this means putting a 440 rig on your Christmas list! If MORI doesn't use the frequency, somebody else will.

SOMEBODY AT THE LAST MEETING SAID...

"Can we say the word Radio Shack on the air now??? YES. You can say anything the FCC allows you to say on the air now. That includes Radio Shack, and other brand names. I even challenge the membership to a brand names net on the .67 machine just to drive the point home. It's OKAY! Just be yourself.

SOMEBODY ELSE SAID...

"Can we use the autopatch yet? Or is it just for emergencies??" Well, I really don't know how to stress the importance of using the autopatch. I would not like to stop at just saying that you can use it. I would like to go one step further and say that you are doing your fellow mankind a disservice IF YOU DO NOT use the autopatch at least once a week! The reason for this being that one day you might find yourself in an emergency situation. This being the case, you are probably NOT going to have the calm and collected hand that it takes to dial the autopatch (especially with the small button's on today's radios). What if (by never having used the autopatch) you forget the codes needed in that desperate minute to access the autopatch in order to save someones life? There is no time to practice then, and it would be a horrible time to find out that the codes have changed or that the security features installed in the new controllers don't work the way they used too, etc. USE THE AUTOPATCH! Practice using the patch just like you practice the code or handling NTS traffic. Someday, it could save someone's life.

JAMMER, JAMMER, ON THE WALL ...

By increasing the use of the repeaters and having more repeaters in operation, we are bound to have problems with repeater jammers. Expect it. Be ready for it. But, when it happens just remember these handy tips:

 Don't admit that there is a problem over the air! If you can't continue your conversation, say that you are busy and have to go. Leave it at that. If you can continue the conversation, pretend that there no problem. (IF the jammer thinks that no one can hear him, he is more likely to run

Praying aloud in a public hall, upsets believers in nothing at all.


In silence alone can we meditate, and if God should get credit, well that's great;

and play somewhere.)

2. Don't talk to the jammer or mention anything about tracking him down, finding him, etc. To many people (?), this only serves as a test to see if you or anybody really will find them. Again, for reasons outlined above, the best thing to do is pretend that nothing is even happening and that everything is business as usual.

Check the input of the repeater to see if you can hear the station. If you can, chances are that he is close by.

4. IF he is close by you might get in your car or go on foot around your neighborhood to determine his location by taking your antenna off of your rig when the signal gets strong enough and then noting the S-meter reading. (DO NOT at any time approach someone and accuse them or make demands for them to stop. This could be dangerous, and illegal. Don't try and play policeman.) Start a log of the times the jammer starts and stops. (This is useful to determine if there is a pattern.)

 If you do locate the station or can hear it on the input of the repeater make note of it and the signal strength along with the time log.

 Contact a club official that can coordinate efforts in the club and uge your information to make a case for the FCC.

Again, NEVER approach someone you think is responsible for the illegal transmittions. Let the FCC do that job. You just get the house number or the license plate number.

Also, listen to other repeaters and see if they are having problems. Try to help them if you can. Maybe you can make ham radio more enjoyable for all of OKC.

THE "BREAK" SYSTEM...

Have you ever wondered why when you say "BREAK" it seems like someone always says, "Go ahead station with emergency traffic!" Well, it used to be practice and an ARRL suggestion to use the word "break" in traffic handling. As a matter of fact, saying "break" meant that you had emergency traffic. If you said "break break", you better have a life or death situation or get out of Dodge! By saying "break break break", you were implying that you had almost a national emergency of the utmost importance and needed the frequency immediately! It is a good system and would work well if everybody knew the terms. This is why everybody says just to say your callsign if you want to be recognized and if you have and emergency say, "Break!"
