

Minutes of the CORA meeting for January 12th, 2002

The CORA luncheon started at 12:00 noon at the Skyline Restaurant, and a fine lunch was had by all.

The meeting began at 1:00 PM and was opened by Chuck, KC5EZS, vice president and acting President of CORA. Nineteen directors from six clubs attended plus the Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer of CORA. There were seven visitors; W5PDH, K5OL, KD5LPV, KA8NBQ, KC5KJE, WB5SYT, and K5DLE.

Chuck, KC5EZS, opened the meeting. Hal and Linda Miller were recognized for all the work they had given both to the C&E and to CORA.

Secretary's Report

The secretary of CORA gave the minutes for the meeting of November 27th, 2001. The minutes were approved.

New Business

Chuck did not want to be president of CORA, as he had little experience in the organization, and Ron McCubbin, KC5QCV, was nominated and elected President of CORA, and took over the meeting.

Linda Miller volunteered to be Editor of the C&E, provided that the printer takes over collating and mailing the C&E. This was agreed to. Linda is now Editor of the C&E.

As was expressed in the December issue, with the postal rate increase coming in July 2002, the C&E will have to go to a dollar an issue. Compared to many other magazines out there, the C&E is a bargain.

In the October 2001 issue was a month by month breakdown of the cost of the C&E. The bottom line then was that it barely broke even at present costs at \$0.75 an issue. With the upcoming rate increase in July by the USPS and the extra cost of

letting the printer collate and mail the C&E, our best estimate is that the break even will be a \$1.00 an issue.

CORA exists to put on Ham Holiday and to publish the C&E. It is recognized nationwide. At the present time CORA subsidizes C&E by about \$75.00 a month. The cost of letting the printer collate and mail the C&E for us is about \$40.00 to \$60.00 a month. Going up to a \$1.00 an issue should put the C&E into the black.

The CORA directors will be going to their respective clubs to explain to their members why we have to do this, and to ask for approval of it. If CORA gets approval from its member clubs it will go into effect.

An exploratory committee was formed to see if they could find an alternate site for Ham Holiday. Members of the committee are Gene, KC5CNT; Chuck, KC5EZS; and Ron, KC5QCV.

New Meeting Site

The meeting site and date have changed. Beginning in February 2002, CORA will meet at the Skyline Restaurant on the second Saturday of every month. Lunch will be at 12:00 noon, and the meeting will start at 1:00 PM. Talk-in frequency is 146.82 (-).

The next meeting will be at 12:00 noon at the Skyline Restaurant on February 9th, 2002. Hope to see you there!



Charlie would put on quite a show trying to lift his coffee. People would come to the café just to see the latest joke.



AMATEUR RADIO NEWSLINE(tm) REPORT #1274 - January 11 2002

THE LAW: NEW HAMPSHIRE HAM WINS ANTENNA CASE

Meantime, a lot closer to the ground, the ARRL Letter reports that a New Hampshire ham appears to have won a battle to erect an antenna support structure on his property. But says the League, it remains to be seen, however, whether Jerry Muller, KOTV, of Hudson will be allowed to erect the extensive system of three towers that he'd originally planned.

Unlike many amateur antenna battles, this case did not pit Muller against the town. In December 1998, Muller applied for a permit to erect three 100-foot antenna structures on his property, and the town of Hudson granted the permit. Three of Muller's neighbors appealed the grant of the permit, but the Hudson Zoning Board affirmed the grant. The neighbors then sued the town and won, resulting in the order for Muller to dismantle the towers.

Now, in a 4-0 vote, with one justice abstaining, the Supreme Court of New Hampshire has reversed a lower court ruling but it is not a 100% victory. Writing for the court, New Hampshire Chief Justice David A. Brock concluded that the lower court's order requiring Muller to dismantle his towers violated the limited federal preemption known as PRB-1 as well as New Hampshire's statutory codification of PRB-1. However Brock also agreed with the lower court that Muller's three-tower installation did not qualify as a "customary, incidental and subordinate" accessory use permitted by Hudson's ordinance.

While another amateur in Hudson has a tower at the same height, there are no instances of three such towers on the same property. Nevertheless, Brock said that Muller's installation may be permitted within the framework of PRB-1, if Muller can demonstrate that his three towers are necessary to "reasonably accommodate" his communications needs. THAT FINAL ITEM: FANTASTIC VOYAGE REDUX

And finally this week, the world of medical communications research has finally caught up with the lights of Hollywood. This, as the government approves a tiny radio camera-in-a-capsule that patients can swallow. It is a camera that will transmit pictures to give doctors a close-up view of what is inside of you.

Amateur Radio Newsline's Mert Garlick, N6AWE, has "The more: new transmitting video pill is made by Given Imaging Ltd. in Israel. It is called the M2A Swallowable Imaging Capsule. It is also exceeding tiny. In fact it is so small that it is easily swallowed by the patient. Its inventors say that it then painlessly winds its way through the digestive tract and uses wireless technology to transmit full color pictures to a belt pack receiver worn by the patient. That unit also decodes the signal and records the information as the patient goes about his or her daily routine."

A U.S. spokesman for Given Imaging says that doctors who wish to use the video imaging pill will have to buy a specialized \$20,000 computer workstation. Each camera capsule costs about \$450. For the Amateur Radio Newsline, I'm Mert Garlick, N6AWE, in Los Angeles.

The entire system is reminiscent of the science fiction movie "Fantastic Voyage." In that film a submarine and its crew of medical specialists are miniaturized and injected into the bloodstream of a critically injured man to perform an operation to save his life while receiving instructions by two way radio. (Science Today)

HAM RADIO IN SPACE: TAXI TO SATELLITE QRM ENDED

Some good news for satellite operators. Thanks to some hard work by the International Amateur Radio Union, the troublesome F-M signals to ham satellites from Mexican taxi cabs are for the most part gone. Amateur Radio Newsline's Norm Seeley, KI7UP, has the details:

According to the IARU Monitoring System newsletter it now appears that FM radio transmissions from the taxi drivers in the cities of San Luis and Sonora, Mexico area are no longer getting into the 2-meter uplink of the UOSAT 14 ham satellite. The issue was raised by many involved in ham radio satellite communications including Ray Soifer, W2RS, of AMSAT North America. The newsletter says that it was Soifers plea to the VHF and Satellite Committee at the 2001 IARU Region 2 Conference in Guatemala City generated extra interest and concern about this and similar problems. This lead to some very productive discussions between the Mexican telecommunications administration Federacion and the Mexicana de Radio Experimentadores which is Mexicos national Amateur Radio society.

Credit also is given to Alejandro Pereida, XE2BSS, for his thorough technical analysis of the problem and for his persistence in pursuing the matter from beginning to end. The end being the removal of the interfereing signals from the UOSAT 14 two meter uplink passband.

The newsletter reports that after a lot of correspondence and negotiations on this issue took place over the past eighteen months. It also credits Lorne Libin, XE1V, as being an important mediator during this period. (AMSAT)

Hot Damn, I'm going to work Antarctica! Well, not quite, it was K8RFS calling for KC4AA. How embarrassing. If Ohio ever becomes a DXCC Entity, I've got it made.

However... On Christmas Eve... The rig was still parked on 14.243 when I turned it on and KC4AAA was booming in at an honest 5/9. Nifty pile-up, too, so make-um no mistake-um, this was The Real Deal and I made the Q on the fifth or sixth call. 100 Watts into a wire and I'm there with a 5/5 signal report coming back. I always wanted to do that and Thank You, Santa! Say what you want about Amateur Radio, but this is one hobby where there's almost always a second chance for everything...

I've also seen some amazing DX reports from December... Our own Coy, N5OK reported a fine list of Six Meter contacts throughout Europe and I lucked into a 50 MHz Q with KL7NO in grid BP-54. I still haven't worked Europe on Six, but there will be a another chance. And I say that for the benefit of Gen'l Dave, W5ATV who's still listening for his first chance to work P5 as I write this. Could be a Q by now...?

In other news, Fred, KB5BQA recently acquired a very nifty DC-to-Daylight TS-2000 transceiver that he tested with a little Six Meter DX from a VO1 in Newfoundland. Rumor has it Fred got slightly excited by a non-standard phonetic for the grid square and, for a moment, thought he'd worked Germany. If that wasn't funny enough, KD5DLL made the passing comment on a local Net that he thought Newfoundland was in Europe... Sometimes I wonder about Mark... They will depart on the 25th for the island of Southern Thule some 500 km to the southeast, near the southern end of the South Sandwich Islands chain, where they plan to be active from January 28th to February 3rd. Operators, QSL information, bands and modes of operation will be announced later.

James Brooks, 9V1YC issued a press release on December 3rd regarding their upcoming DX'pedition. He states "VP8/sg South Georgia & VP8/ss South Sandwich will be activated in January and February of 2002. Operators will be EI6FR, EI5IQ, HB9ASZ, PA3FQA, KØIR, W3WL, K4UEE, VE3EJ, N5KO, K5TR, W7EW and 9V1YC. The exact dates, call signs and QSL managers will not be released until we are on the air."

XRØ, SAN FELIX ISLAND

A DX'pedition to San Felix Island will be conducted March 12 through the 30th using the call sign XRØX. Located 900 km northwest of Valparaiso, San Felix is a barren rocky island about 3 km across, with two small islets nearby. Access to the site is restricted due to the presence of a military garrison and little is known of the natural history of this island. The primary goals are to provide radio contacts from a remote and seldom-activated island along with documenting indigenous species. The 13-member team includes NP4IW, K5AB,

ISNHJ, N7CQQ, DJ9ZB, CEØYWS, N6MZ, KO4RR, KK6EK, W6KK, HB9AHL, K5AND and N6TQS. Their 20-ft. container of gear will travel from Valparaiso (Chile) to San Felix aboard the Chilean Navy vessel "Chacabuco" and be airlifted on the island by a Chilean Navy helicopter. This DX'pedition is financed by the participants and supplemented by donations from DX associations, radio clubs and individuals. YA, AFGHANISTAN

Well-known DX'er Peter Casier, ON6TT (aka 5X1T) was heard on November 21st as YA/ON6TT/M operating in a convoy, and later that week from the foreign ministry of the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan (Northern Alliance). He was issued the call sign YA5T which can be used on all bands by Peter, ON6TT, Matts, SM7PKK and Robert, S53R. Wayne Mills, N7NG/1 and Manager of the Membership Service Dept for the ARRL reports: "The DXCC Desk has received acceptable documentation for YA5T as operated by ON6TT, S53R, SM7PKK or ON4WW. The documentation is valid for QSO's made after November 20, 2001. No other calls or operations have been approved as of this date." A press release on Tuesday, November 27th by Peter states, "The YA5T license is secured and approved by the DXCC for use by S53R, SM7PKK, ON4WW and ON6TT. The team members all work for the United Nations World Food Programme. Only Peter, ON6TT is in Afghanistan at the moment. The other team members will be in Afghanistan as required by the organization. Peter is expected to be on the air in the evenings (local time) starting November 28th from Kabul. Due to cargo restrictions on the humanitarian flights their equipment will

be low power only with limited antennas, restricting pileup operations to the main HF bands. When working conditions and security arrangements allow it, the team will mount a larger scale operation. The license has no time restriction and allows them to operate from anywhere within Afghanistan on 160 Meters to SHF with power up to 500W. The earlier operation by YA/ON6TT/M is not valid for DXCC. Any contributions included with the QSL cards will be donated to humanitarian projects within Afghanistan." Peter was spotted early Sunday morning, December 2nd, operating on 21295 kHz between 1300-1430z. He was also heard on 28495 kHz working Europe just before going to 15 Meters. The QSL Manager for YA5T is KU9C and is being coordinated between Peter and the Northern California DX Association (NCDXF). An ingestible video camera designed to give doctors a close-up view from inside the digestive tract is starting to wend its way through the first Bay Area patients. "It's smaller than the multivitamin I take," said Dr. Jacques Van Dam, a gastroenterologist and professor of medicine at Stanford University Medical Center. Van Dam has been among the first Northern California physicians to try out the new "M2A imaging capsule" in post-marketing clinical trials by the device's manufacturer, Israel-based Given Imaging Ltd. at 25 medical centers around the country.

Doctors at San Francisco General Hospital have begun using the video camera-in-apill to track down mysterious internal bleeding problems. It's hardly as dramatic as filmmakers imagined it might be in the 1966 sci-fi classic "Fantastic Voyage," in which a shrunken submarine and medical crew traveled around in a dying man's bloodstream doing battle with antibodies. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration gave the manufacturer the go-ahead in August to begin marketing the capsules as a diagnostic tool. About 2,000 patients have swallowed the cameras worldwide so far, according to David Bjerken, marketing manager at Given Imaging's Atlanta-based U.S. subsidiary.

Each pill-camera sells for about \$450. The main cost, about \$20,000 to \$30,000, goes for the computer equipment and software system doctors need to analyze the color images. Weighing just 4 grams, the digital camera comes with a built-in power supply, strobe light and radio-frequency transmitter. After the patient swallows the camera, natural movement of the bowel propels the device through the intestinal tract on a voyage that generally takes about eight hours to complete. The M2A takes the concept of "disposable camera" to a whole new technological level. After the one-way journey is complete, the M2A is passed naturally in the stool and sold on the Ham Radio section of eBay in "as is" condition with no reserve.

Pictures are taken at the rate of two per second and beamed to a wireless recorder,

which the patient wears on a belt slung around the waist. The images are collected by eight antennas attached to the patient's abdomen, which also keep track of the camera position for each picture. At Stanford, the imaging capsule led to quick diagnosis of two patient's problems that were repaired by surgery. Similar results have been reported by doctors at San Francisco General. In clinical trials that led to the FDA's marketing approval, the device was able to detect 12 of 14 lesions in a group of test subjects, an 86 percent success rate that far exceeded the typical results of conventional methods.

The new technology is not without its own limitations as the lens can be obscured by partly digested food. Another drawback is that there is no way to back up or reposition for a closer view at something a doctor might find interesting. The camera takes all of its pictures from one end of the 1 1/8-inch-long capsule, which can tumble and roll. That's not a problem in the small intestine where the relatively narrow passageway tends to keep the lens pointed one way. Doctors said it makes no difference which direction the camera is pointed, saying they can read images taken both coming and going.

But the new camera is essentially useless for imaging larger areas. Given Imaging officials said they are working to add more capabilities, including the possibility of devising some means of remote control. Eventually, Bjerken said, engineers might find a way to take advantage of the nerve system that naturally keeps things moving in the gut. "Propellers," he said, "probably are not going to work." Radio talk show host Art Bell, W6OBB plans to feature the device on an upcoming show and has offered the following advice: "Go toward the light, go toward the light..." <splash!>

New Amateur Radio Antenna to be Installed During Spacewalk

Amateur Radio on the International Space Station Board Chairman Frank Bauer, KA3HDO, has announced that one of the four new ARISS antennas could be installed as soon as next week. It's anticipated that the "WA3" VHF-UHF flexible tape antenna will be installed on one end of the ISS Service Module during a scheduled January 14 spacewalk--or EVA.

"The Russian team is able to deploy this particular antenna sooner than the others because it is located very close to where the four RF connections go into the Service Module," Bauer said.

Expedition Four Commander Yuri flight Onufrienko, RK3DUO, and engineers Carl Walz, KC5TIE, and Dan Bursch, KD5PNU, are beginning their second month in orbit aboard the ISS. They have not yet been active on Amateur Radio, although several ARISS school contacts are pending. Onufrienko and Walz will carry out the EVA. NASA says the two will move a Russian cargo crane to the Russian Functional Cargo Block for future assembly work. Bursch will operate the Canadarm2 robotic arm from inside the space station."

Installation of the new antenna on the Service Module paves the way for two separate ham stations aboard Space Station Alpha. Plans call for a 2-meter station to remain in the Functional Cargo Block using the Russian antennas that had been used to dock the FGB but now used for ARISS. A second 70-cm station will be set up in the Service Module using the new antenna.

A DX bulletin replaces or is added to the regular bulletins between 0100 UTC (8 PM EST) Thursdays and 0100 UTC (8 PM EST) Fridays.

In a communications emergency, monitor W1AW for special bulletins as follows: Voice on the hour, Teleprinter at 15 minutes past the hour, and CW on the half hour.

FCC licensed amateurs may operate the station from 1500 UTC to 1700 UTC (10 AM to 12 PM EST), and then from 1800 UTC to 2045 UTC (1 PM to 3:45 PM EST) Monday through Friday. Be sure to bring your current FCC amateur license or a photocopy.

Vanity processing may resume soon

Vanity call sign processing--an unintentional anthrax scare victim--may soon resume. The FCC has not processed any vanity call sign applications--paper or electronic--since October 14. Vanity applications received after that date remain on hold, although all vanity fees have been collected.

The vanity gridlock got started after mail received between October 15 and November 1 was diverted from the FCC's Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, office for decontamination in the Washington, DC, area. That mail, believed to contain more than 100 vanity applications filed on paper, has not been returned to Gettysburg.

Current FCC policy says that paper and electronic vanity applications get equal processing priority, so the Commission halted vanity processing altogether until it could resolve the mail snafu.

FCC staffers in Gettysburg have been attempting to work around the roadblock. Using vanity fee payment data from the FCC's fiscal agent, Mellon Bank in Pittsburgh, the Licensing and Technical Analysis Branch of the FCC's Wireless Telecommunications Bureau in Gettysburg has been contacting applicants directly to have them resubmit their applications.

The FCC now is asking applicants whose paper vanity filings may have arrived at Mellon Bank between October 15 and November 1 and who have not been contacted to get in touch with the FCC to find out if they need to forward a copy or facsimile of their original paperwork. The request affects only vanity applicants who filed on paper--not electronic filers.

Before contacting the FCC, however, applicants were being asked to check the Universal Licensing System to see if their applications are already on file with the FCC (under "SEARCH," click "Applications," click "Continue," enter present call sign in the "Call Sign" field, and press the Enter key or click "Search"--at the bottom of the page. Click on the underlined number, if any, under "File Number" to view an application). If an application already is on file, no further action is required.

If no application is on file, or if no Web access is available, applicants should telephone the FCC Call Center, toll-free 888-225-5322; e-mail rtaylor@fcc.gov or fax 717-338-2696.

The Licensing Division believes it now has all paper applications received October 15, 2001, in hand, and it could process all applications received on that date as soon as this week. The FCC has a record of when it received the paper vanity applications, and all submittals will be processed in chronological order.

The FCC has been acting on amateur renewals and administrative updates filed on-line via the Wireless Telecommunications Bureau's Universal Licensing System. As of December 3, 2001, anyone filing an application with the

FCC must include an FCC Registration Number (FRN).

ARLB004 FCC Acts on October 15, 2001, Vanity Applications

The vanity call sign logjam has begun to break up. The FCC granted 27 vanity call signs January 9, based on applications received October 15, 2001.

FCC policy gives paper and electronically filed vanity applications equal priority. Mail problems due to the recent anthrax scare caused some applications filed on paper to be delayed, and vanity processing has been on hold since last fall. FCC

Licensing Branch personnel have been attempting to obtain new paperwork from applicants, however.

Prior to this week, the FCC had not issued any new vanity call signs since last October 30. The FCC has a record of when it receives all vanity applications. Once the Commission has all paper and electronic applications for a given date, all submittals will be processed in chronological order.

All vanity fee payments have been recorded and deposited or charged to credit card holders' accounts. The FCC has been using vanity fee payment data from the FCC's fiscal agent, Mellon Bank in Pittsburgh to contact applicants directly to have them resubmit their applications.

FCC invites petition comments

The FCC is seeking comments on four Amateur Radio rule making petitions filed recently and put on public notice this week. Comments are due by February 7, 2002, in petitions seeking to legally separate wideband and narrowband modes on 160 meters, allow hams to bequeath their call signs "in memoriam" to a specific club, expand HF operating privileges for Novice and Tech Plus operators, and permit retransmission on amateur frequencies of NASA manned spacecraft communications.

A proposal from veteran Top Band operators and contesters Bill Tippett, W4ZV, and Jeff Briggs, K1ZM, asks the FCC to subdivide 160 meters into modespecific subbands. The petition, submitted to the FCC in September, has been designated as RM-10352. Tippett and Briggs contend that the ARRL band plan for 160 meters--modified last year after lengthy consideration by the ad hoc ARRL 160-Meter Band Plan Committee on which both men sat--does not go far enough and is unenforceable. They want the FCC to prohibit SSB, AM and other wideband modes below 1.843 MHz, as the ARRL band plan recommends.

Tippett and Briggs said that while the topic of their petition did arise during the ARRL committee's deliberations, their petition is an independent effort with no connection to the committee or the ARRL.

The Quarter Century Wireless Association has asked the FCC to change its amateur vanity call sign system rules to permit individual amateurs to, in effect, will a call sign to a designated club as an "in memoriam" call sign. The FCC has designated the petition, submitted in December, as RM-10353. The QCWA notes that the current vanity rule "excludes current licensees from speaking for themselves" while they're still alive and "requires their relatives to speak for them post mortem."

Novice licensee John S. Rippey, W3ULS, has petitioned the FCC to expand HF phone and CW privileges for Novice operators. The FCC has designated the petition, submitted in December, as RM-10354. Rippey held a General ticket in the 1950s and 1960s and obtained his former call sign after relicensing as a Novice in 1999. Rippey has asked the FCC to grant Novice and Technician (with Element 1 credit) licensees new or expanded operating privileges on 80, 40, 30, 17, 15, 12 and 10 meters. His suggestions include SSB privileges for Novices and Tech Plus licensees on 17 and 12 meters.

The NASA John H. Glenn Research Center Amateur Radio Club is seeking a modification in wording to the Part 97 rule that already permits amateur retransmission of NASA manned shuttle communications. The petition has been designated as RM-10355. The club wants the Amateur Service rule, Sec 97.113(e), to include International Space Station communications as well as any manned spacecraft in the future.

ENFORCEMENT: EX-KV4FZ'S NEW LICENSE APPLICATION DESIGNATED FOR HEARING

I'm Bill Pasternak, WA6ITF. The FCC has designated a new ham radio license application filed by Herbert L. Schoenbohm, the ex-KV4FZ, for a public hearing. According to the order released on January 9th, the hearing will determine

whether Schoenbohm possesses the requisite character qualifications to be a Commission licensee. Schoenbohm lost a series of appeals during the 1990's and was ordered off the air last year. He was given twenty days to request that the hearing on his new application be held. If he fails to do so, his application will be dismissed. More on this story, next week. (FCC)

ENFORCEMENT: YOU CANT SEND FELONY COMPLAINT AFFIDAVITS TO OTHER HAMS

The FCC wants to hear immediately from any ham who receives notification that a felony complaint has been lodged against him or her by Glen Baxter, K1MAN. This after the government tells the Belgrade Lake Maine operator to stop sending other radio operators so-called Standard Felony Complaint Affidavits. Speaking on his Rain Enforcement Log, FCC Special Counsel for Amateur Radio Enforcement Riley Hollingsworth says that this is not the first time Baxter has been warned:

Hollingsworth: "We reiterated a warning issued by the United States Attorney in Maine to a Belgrade Lakes operator who had sent so-called Felony Complaint Affidavits to licensees who had refused to clear the frequency for his broadcasts, or bulletin shows or whatever they are. Complaints about the nature of the transmissions are also under review as well, and we will be looking at those. That went to Glenn Baxter, K1MAN.

The United States Attorney in that case has warned Baxter that if he continues sending the so-called Felony Complaint Affidavits he may be subject to federal criminal charges for misrepresentation and for using the U.S. Mail to make threats."

ENFORCEMENT: FCC -ALLEGEDLY UNCOORDINATED IN CALIFORNIA

Still with enforcement news, the FCC has notified Dean K. Perrins, N6HWI, of Freemont California that his alleged uncoordinated repeater on 443.725 MHz

is causing interference to the coordinated K6TWI system. This is a repeater which operates on the same frequency.

The FCC says that it has information that Perrins has been notified several times regarding the interference problem but that he has not taken any steps to resolve the problem. Perrins was given twenty days from the date of notification to respond to the FCC. (FCC)

ENFORCEMENT: FCC -ALLEGEDLY UNCOORDINATED IN FLORIDA

In still another repeater interference case
Joseph Bushel Jr., W2DWR, of Live Oak
Florida has been directed by the FCC to
respond to a complaint that he is operating
a repeater on 146.94 MHz after being
denied coordination by the Florida
Repeater Council. The FCC says that
Bushel's repeater is causing interference to
the coordinated K4EHM system and the
government wants him to explain his
actions. The FCC also wants W2DWR to
respond to an allegation that he was
observed transmitting a digital voice
recording an that frequency without ever
identifying the transmission. (FCC)

ENFORCEMENT: FCC- DON'T TALK ON THAT REPEATER

Meanwhile, another Florida ham identified as Thomas Banks, KB4AN of Port Saint Lucie Florida has been notified by the FCC that he is to refrain from using an area repeater. Specifically, the FCC has told Banks that he is not to be heard over the Saint Lucie Repeater Association's AF4CN machine as requested by the system's trustee. (FCC)
